Badger Cull Dropped in Favour of Vaccination

On the 20th March, the Welsh Government Environment Minister, John Griffiths, announced that he would not be implementing a cull of badgers as part of efforts to eradicate bovine TB in the intensive action area in North Pembrokeshire.

Speaking about his decision, the Minister said:

"This has been a difficult decision to take. In making it, I have considered the likely benefits that vaccination or culling could have. Any decision to cull would need to be justified on the basis that it would be necessary to eliminate or substantially reduce the incidence of bovine TB in cattle.

"I have considered the evidence provided to me, including scientific and legal advice and have noted the advice on potential benefit that might be obtained by vaccination or culling. At present I am not satisfied that a cull of badgers would be necessary to bring about a substantial reduction in cases of TB in cattle."

The Minister emphasised that TB eradication was a long term commitment that would require the application of new technologies and scientific developments as they became available. He had also asked the Chief Vet to convene a working group of experts to develop a cattle vaccination strategy so that best use could be made of such a vaccination once it became available.

The announcement was welcomed by the Wildlife Trust of South and West Wales, who stated that 'vaccination, alongside movement control and appropriate management is a progressive approach to disease control'. Rachel Sharp, CEO of the Wildlife

Trusts Wales, said 'the decision opens the way for Wales to initiate a full scale vaccination programme that in the longer term will prove both sustainable and effective'.

The Farmer's Union of Wales has expressed concerns over the legal and scientific advice upon which the Minister's decision was based. In a letter to the Minister, FUW president Emyr Jones asked for the advice to be published. The FUW hold that vaccination is unproven in large scale trials, whereas culling programmes have consistently reduced instances of TB in cattle since the 1970s.

A cull of badgers in areas of England is still planned and it will be interesting to compare the efficacy of the approaches in the two countries.



Identifying Invasive Shrimps – A New Key

Invasive, non-native species are one of the most serious threats to freshwater biodiversity, both globally and in Britain. Whilst many non-native species are relatively ecologically and economically benign, a minority can have much

more serious consequences.

A particular cause for concern are the 'freshwater shrimps' (amphipods and isopods) which are often abundant in freshwaters and therefore important in freshwater food chains. Freshwater shrimps do not disperse easily between river basins, but can exploit human activities such as canals or water transfers, with serious effects on native biodiversity. As well as competing with native shrimps, invasive shrimps also threaten native animals and plants, for example by eating other invertebrates and fish eggs. Once established, there is no means of eradicating them. In the Netherlands, ecosystems have experienced 'invasional meltdown' where most native species have been ousted and more than 95% of the biomass consists of invasive species.



A recent example is the 'killer shrimp', *Dikerogammarus villosus*, which has spread rapidly across Europe since the construction of the Rhine-Main-Danube Canal in 1992 and has recently colonised Britain, including Cardiff Bay and Eglwys Nunnydd Reservoir. Strict biosecurity measures are in place at both sites with the support of all stakeholders, and an extensive Environment Agency monitoring programme has not found any further killer shrimp colonies in Wales.

As well as *D. villosus*, there are already six established non-native freshwater shrimp species in Britain (compared to just five native species). Two North American species. Crangonyx pseudogracilis and Gammarus tigrinus, are widespread in Britain, including Pembrokeshire. Another 15 invasive shrimp species are thought likely to colonise Britain in the near future. In order to improve our understanding of how to manage and restrict the spread of these species, we need to be able to identify them reliably.

Funded DEFRA. Freshwater bv the Biological Association has produced a detailed, well illustrated key that includes all freshwater native and non-native species occurring in or likely to arrive in Britain. Prince of Wales Feather Moss at Manor House Wildlife Park

Sam Bosanquet of CCW visited Manor House Wildlife Park in January this year and, "was amazed to be faced with a tree covered with the rare Prince of Wales Feathermoss (Leptodon smithii)" almost as soon as he entered the park at "the spectacular Sycamore by the entrance to the Wallaby enclosure."

Sam returned to the park in February and, working with Senior Keeper Paul Harry, they carried out a full survey of all the trees of the park. They found approximately 16 m sq of the Prince of Wales feather-moss on 10 trees. This is by far the largest colony in Wales, in both terms of area covered and the number of trees occupied.

Lepotodon smithii has been added to section 42 of the Countryside & Rights of Way Act, identifying it as a high priority for conservation in Wales because of the decline in both population and range. It is a highly distinctive moss that got its common name from the resemblance of dry shoots to the Prince of Wales' crest. There are Welsh records from 16 sites, but many of these are old and Leptodon has not been seen since the 1970s at more than half of them.



Sam noted that, "the remaining Glamorgan colony is tiny, leaving six populations in Pembrokeshire as the last toe-hold for this moss in Wales. Loss of mature trees coupled with a poor colonising ability are blamed for the decline of *Leptodon*, and the inability to reproduce may be particularly acute on the northern edge of the species' range.

Sam's report records that, "The trees at Manor House are thought to be ideal for the *Leptodon* population because they are sufficiently widely spaced for trunks to be sunny and warm for part of the day, but not as exposed as many hedgerow trees. Four other Pembrokeshire sites support relatively strong populations of *Leptodon*, and all of these are in sunny but sheltered valleys; a fifth colony, at Knowle crossroads, holds just a single 30x30 cm patch on a young Sycamore."

Another species of conservation significance recorded during the survey was the tiny nationally scarce liverwort Rossetti's Pouncewort (*Cololejeunea rossettiana*) in the limestone outcrop near the Flamingo Pool and Bat Cave. Only two other populations of Rossetti's Pouncewort are known in Pembrokeshire - in limestone valleys at Bosherston and Manorbier and there are only two known sites in Glamorgan, with none in Carmarthenshire or Ceredigion, and fewer than 100 in the whole of the UK.

In all 65 species of moss (53 spp.) and liverwort (12 spp.) were recorded during the survey.

Angling Litter Campaign

The Marine Conservation Society (MCS) are working in partnership with the Countryside Council for Wales, The Pembrokeshire Coast National Park Authority, National Trust, Environment Agency, Pembrokeshire Coastal Forum, Neptune's Army of Rubbish Cleaners (NARC), Keep Wales Tidy and Pembrokeshire Federation of Angling Coaches to tackle the problem of angling litter on the Pembrokeshire coast.



The extent of the issue has been highlighted by NARC, a group of volunteer divers who dive popular angling spots around the Coast and pick up the litter. For example, in one day divers collected 247 fishing weights and 450 hooks at Stackpole Quay and released 25 spidercrabs, 1 lobster and a dogfish entangled in discarded fishing line.

The project is being piloted in Pembrokeshire and Northern Ireland with a view to applying it to other areas of the Welsh coast if it is successful. The project will be launched during Pembrokeshire Fish Week.
